Service begins at 7:00 PM.


Resurrection Service Sunday April 4

Loving His Appearing

Chapter Nine

Face To Face

Introduction

In 2009, we saw a phenomenon in the popularity of the new president of the United States. Many people were truly infatuated with the man and they looked to him adoringly. They had tingly feelings when they heard him speak. They became teary eyed in his presence. They lavished him with superlatives of praise.

This is not a new phenomenon in our culture. When the rock band the Beatles arrived on the scene back in the 1960's, we witnessed teen girls screaming and jumping up and down and fainting just at the sight of those young men. They were literally idol-ized.

Many of us tend to be more reserved in our saluting of people we respect. We may admire certain people and have great regard for them. We may verbally cheer them or even offer some applause, but we usually do not go weak in the knees just because they enter a room.

But, what will it be like to be in the presence of Jesus Christ and look directly into His face? Some have already seen Him, and their experiences have been recorded for us in the Bible. Perhaps from this record we may be able to get an idea of what it will be like for us to see the Saviour face to face.

Before His Incarnation

In John chapter 12, we are told that Isaiah saw the glory of Jesus Christ. John mentions two statements that Isaiah made. In John 12:38 he quotes from Isaiah 53:1, Lord, who hath believed our report? And to whom hath the arm of the Lord been revealed? In John 12:40 he quotes from Isaiah 6:10, He hath blinded their eyes and hardened their heart; that they should not see with their eyes, nor understand with their heart, and be converted, and I should heal them. Then in John 12:41 John makes this remarkable statement, These things said Esaias [Isaiah] when he [Isaiah] saw his [Jesus Christ's] glory, and spake of him [Jesus Christ].

What did Isaiah see? If Isaiah chapter six is where Isaiah saw the glory of Jesus Christ, then Jesus Christ is the one that Isaiah saw sitting upon a throne, high and lifted up. It was therefore the train of Jesus Christ that filled the temple. It was Jesus Christ that was surrounded by seraphim, and it was to Jesus Christ that the seraphim sang Holy, holy, holy, is the LORD of hosts: the whole earth is full of his glory.

And what was Isaiah's reaction to this experience of seeing Jesus Christ in his pre-incarnate glory on the throne of heaven? Isaiah said, *Woe is me!* (Isaiah 6:5). He was totally undone by being so close to the LORD of glory and by being able to look directly into His face. In Isaiah's own words, *I am a man of unclean lips, and I dwell in the midst of a people of unclean lips: for mine eyes have seen the King, the LORD of hosts. Isaiah was far from presumptuous in the presence of the LORD. He was impressed with how worthless his own life was in comparison to the glory of the One who sat upon the throne.*

While He Was On The Earth

Multitudes of people saw the incarnate Son of God while He walked on earth. We have the record of some of these people and how they reacted to Him.

Zacchaeus was a short man. He was a tax collector, which means he was legally able to cheat people. He heard that Jesus was passing through his town of Jericho, so Zacchaeus climbed a tree to have an opportunity to see the Lord. Luke 19:5 says, And when Jesus came to the place, he looked up, and saw him, and said unto him, Zacchaeus, make haste, and come down; for today I must abide at thy house. From that moment of personal encounter with Jesus Christ, Zacchaeus was a changed man. Luke 19:8 gives us Zacchaeus' response, Behold, Lord, the half of my goods I give to the poor; and if I have taken anything from any man by false accusation, I restore him fourfold.

Peter spent much time with Christ and undoubtedly had numerous opportunities to look into the face and eyes of the Savior. There is one particular such experience that was perhaps more momentous than any other for Peter. When Jesus announced to His disciples that He was going to die, Peter was adamant in his declaration that he was willing to die with Christ and would never under any circumstances deny Him (Matthew 26:33-35). Yet when Christ was arrested and held by the High Priest

and Peter was given three opportunities to identify himself with Christ, each time Peter vehemently denied any association. After the third time, just as Jesus predicted, a rooster crowed. At that very moment the eyes of Peter and Jesus connected (Luke 22:61). What happened to Peter in that moment? Luke 22:62 tells us that he went out, and wept bitterly. But from that moment forward, Peter was truly a changed man. Three days later, Peter raced to the empty tomb and saw it with eyes of faith. He preached on the day of Pentecost and 3,000 souls received Christ. He served faithfully in the gospel of Jesus Christ, and history tells us that he was finally martyred for his identification with the Lord.

There were a number of people who looked into the face of Jesus Christ while He was being tried and while He hung on the cross. Some of them looked at Him with ridicule and disgust, spitting in His face (Matthew 26:67), covering His face so they could make fun of Him without the gaze of His eyes (Mark 14:65), striking Him in the face with disdain and arrogance (Luke 22:64). Others had an entirely different reaction. There was a centurion who led the detail put in charge of crucifying Christ. We are told in Matthew 27:54 that this centurion and his soldiers were watching Jesus as He hung on the cross. He saw the strange events that surrounded the suffering and death of this unique occupant of the cross, including the three hours of darkness in midday, the earthquake, the graves opening and people coming out of those graves, walking away alive and well. Then the centurion heard Jesus cry out, It is finished! (John 19:30), and Father, into thy hands I commend my spirit (Luke 23:46). Mark 15:39 tells us the centurion's reaction, And when the centurion, which stood over against him, saw that he so cried out, and gave up the ghost, he said, Truly this man was the Son of God. He was convinced and believed!

After the resurrection, Jesus appeared in His glorified body to a number of people, above five hundred in all (1 Corinthians 15:6). Mary Magdalene, the first to see the resurrected Savior, had just one word to say, *Rabboni!* [Master] (John 20:14-16). When Jesus showed His hands and His side to his disciples, they were glad, that is to say, they rejoiced with exceeding great joy! (John 20:20). Even Thomas, who initially doubted the resurrection, was overcome when face to face with the Savior Himself, declaring, *My Lord and my God!* (John 20:24-28).

After His Ascension

Stephen was probably the first to see Christ in His glory after His ascension. Stephen was being stoned to death for preaching the gospel of Christ. Just before the onslaught of his persecutors, Stephen looked up stedfastly into heaven, and saw the glory of God, and Jesus standing on the right hand of God, and said, Behold, I see the heavens opened, and the Son of man standing on the right hand of God (Acts 7:55-56).

Saul, the Pharisee, was busy persecuting the Christians. One day, as he made his way to Damascus with letters from the high priest authorizing him to arrest Christians there, Jesus appeared to him. All he saw was a great light, but the voice of Christ was enough to convince Saul (soon to be Paul) of who He was.

At the end of the first century, John was in exile on the isle of Patmos. While John was worshiping on the Lord's day, he heard a voice behind him. When he turned to see whose voice it was, he saw the ascended, glorious Savior. John gives us a detailed description of Him in Revelation 1:12-16: And I turned to see the voice that spake with me. And being turned, I saw seven golden candlesticks; And in the midst of the seven candlesticks one like unto the Son of man. clothed with a garment down to the foot, and girt about the paps with a golden girdle. His head and his hairs were white like wool, as white as snow; and his eyes were as a flame of fire; And his feet like unto fine brass, as if they burned in a furnace; and his voice as the sound of many waters. And he had in his right hand seven stars: and out of his mouth went a sharp twoedged sword: and his countenance was as the sun shineth in his strength. Then in verse 17 John tells us how he reacted to this amazing sight, And when I saw him. I fell at his feet as dead.

Now

David gives us a testimony of what our present experience can be regarding the face of our Savior. Acts 2:28 quotes from Psalm 16 where David said, Thou hast made known to me the ways of life; thou shalt make me full of joy with thy countenance. The countenance of God is the expression on His face. Even though we cannot physically see His face, David says, we can have joy knowing that God's face is pointed directly at us. If He is looking at us, then He is fully aware of what is happening in our lives and in our hearts. If He is fully aware of what is happening, then

He is personally concerned and will undoubtedly become personally involved.

John tells us in 1 John 1:1-4 that he declares to us what he has seen and heard. The Scriptural record of the disciples first hand interaction with the Savior is an excellent connection for us to that experience. Even though we may not be able to see Christ with our physical eyes, we can read the face of our Savior through the Scriptural record of those who did.

In 2 Corinthians 4:6, Paul testifies that when God commands the light to shine out of darkness, that light shines in our hearts to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ. In other words, the enlightenment we are given by the gospel of Jesus Christ enables us to comprehend the glory of God. This comprehension is in essence the face of Jesus Christ shining upon us. We do not see the features of a physical face, but we see the light of the gospel which gives us an understanding of the glory of His face.

When Moses came down from the mountain, the Israelites could not look upon his face because it shone with the glory of God. It was necessary for Moses to wear a vail over his face to conceal that glory. Sinful men could not bear it (2 Corinthians 3:12-14). In contrast to that, we who have been born again by faith in Christ are able with open face to behold the glory of God (2 Corinthians 3:18) which is communicated to us in the face of Jesus Christ.

While we know no man after the flesh at this time (2 Corinthians 5:16), we are still able to gaze upon His face through the eyes of faith. As faith is the evidence of things not seen (Hebrews 11:1), our faith in Christ and the testimony of Scripture is sufficient for us to comprehend the face of Christ and His gaze of love and compassion upon us.

In The Future

Revelation 22:4 gives us a wonderful prospect. When we become residents of the New Jerusalem, the throne of God and of the Lamb will be in it. It is there, we are told, that we shall see His face. It will be a wonder to behold throughout eternity.

Conclusion

To love Christ's appearing is to adore the Person who is coming! and, to long to see His face! Not everyone longs to see His face. Revelation 6:6

tells us about those who will hide themselves from the face of Him who sitteth on the throne. But for every one of us who professes to believe in Christ, the desire to see Him face to face ought to be the passion of our hearts. What an amazing thing it will be to look into the very face of the one who bore my sin, who shed His blood to pay for my sin, who died and rose again in my place, so that I could live forever with Him. Granted, it will be a most humbling experience and we will undoubtedly be compelled by our own sense of inadequacy to fall down before Him and declare with Isaiah, "Woe is me!" But it will be a time of great rejoicing to be in the physical presence of our Savior and be able to look at Him face to face.

Even so, come Lord Jesus!

Chapter Ten

The Personal Interview

Introduction

I can say I saw a President of the United States It was January 20, 1973. in person. It was a Saturday. It was a chilly day, but not bitter cold. I was in charge of the tract distribution team from Washington Bible College located near Washington, D.C. in Lanham, Maryland. We went to Washington every Saturday morning and distributed tracts, mostly to tourists. This particular day we had extra help and probably distributed more than 20,000 tracts. When it was time for the inauguration to begin, we made our way to the upper side of the U.S. Capital building where the ceremony was to take place. Opposite the Capital building on the other side of First Street, S.E. are two large buildings, the Supreme Court building and the Library of Congress. In the front of the Library of Congress are many steps and a very large porch. This porch is about 700 feet from the steps of the Capital building where President Richard Nixon was sworn in. It was from that distance on that day that I saw a President in person.

I was one insignificant person in a very large crowd. From that distance in that large crowd, I saw President Nixon, but he obviously took no notice of me.

When we are caught up together to meet the Lord in the air (1 Thessalonians 4:17), how many of us will there be? This rapture will include all believers from about 33 A.D. and Acts chapter 2 to the moment of this era when the church is closed and removed from the earth. Will this be millions? Tens of millions? Hundreds of millions? Billions? It will be a huge crowd!

We will all see Jesus – from the crowd! But then, each of us will be given a personal interview with Jesus Christ. This is called the judgement seat of Christ according to 2 Corinthians 5:10. What will that interview be like?

The Personal Nature of the Interview

2 Corinthians 5:10 says that we must "all" appear before the judgment seat of Christ. The word all is a plural word and is all inclusive. This verse then says that "every one" may receive the things done in his body. The term "every one" is singular and suggests that while all will appear before the judgment seat of Christ, it will have a very personal nature to that appearance for each individual who participates.

The Objective of the Interview

The objective of having everyone appear before the judgment seat of Christ is to have each one receive something, to obtain something, to carry away something for themselves.

What is to be received by individuals at the judgment seat of Christ is to be based on what they have done in their bodies while living on earth, whether it be good or bad. Ephesians 6:8 explains, that whatsoever good thing any man doeth, the same shall he receive of the Lord.... And Colossians 3:25 explains that he that doeth wrong shall receive for the wrong which he had done: and there is no respect of persons. According to 1 Corinthians 3:9-15, we understand that this does not consist of the earning or losing of one's salvation, but the receiving reward or the receiving of the loss of reward for one's conduct as a believer.

By contrast, the great white throne judgment described in Revelation 20:13 consists of the judgment of unbelievers. This judgment is also based on the conduct of individuals as they lived their lives on earth. However, at the great white throne judgment, all participants will be found guilty of insufficient good works, no matter how many they have. The result will be that each one will be cast into the lake of fire.

The only thing that gives any value to the works we do here on earth is faith in Christ. Without faith, all work only adds to a person's debt before God, regardless of the nature of that work (Romans 4:4). But when a person believes and trusts in Christ, his faith is counted for righteousness (Romans 4:5). For whatsoever is not of faith is sin (Romans 14:23). The converse of that would be that whatsoever is of faith is righteousness. Therefore, the judgment seat of Christ will issue rewards based on the faithfulness of a believer while he lived here on earth.

The Substance of the Interview

2 Corinthians 5:9 says that we labour, that whether present or absent, we may be accepted of him. Acceptability to God is a condition to be sought by believers only. Unbelievers can never obtain the status of acceptable because without faith it is impossible to please Him (Hebrews 11:6). Only with faith is it possible to please God. Once a person has pleased God with faith in His Son, Jesus Christ, then the believing person can do things which are acceptable unto Him. Without faith, nothing a non believing person does can be acceptable to God.

The judgment seat of Christ is therefore for believing persons only and specifically for those who are in Christ, the church (2 Corinthians 5:17). The behavior of believers who are in Christ will be examined by Christ at His judgment seat to show what the believer has done that is acceptable to Him and what is not acceptable to Him. Seeing as the term "acceptable" is used in the context of the judgment seat of Christ, it is reasonable then to examine other New Testament contexts where the term acceptable is applied to the behavior of believers and understand from them what kind of things Christ will be examining at His judgment seat.

In light of this, the following is a set of questions that Christ may pose to us at His judgment seat.

- 1. While on earth, did you present your body as a living sacrifice to God, Holy, and acceptable to God? (Romans 12:1) After all, this is our reasonable service.
- 2. Did you prove what is that good and acceptable and perfect will of God? (Romans 12:2) Of course, in order to do that, you must not be conformed to this world, but you must be transformed by the renewing of your mind.

- 3. Did you serve God in righteousness, peace, and joy of the Holy Ghost and not for meat and drink? Have you held fast to sound doctrine or served your own belly? (Romans 14:17-18; Romans 16:18)
- 4. Did you send things unto the necessities of God's servants? (Philippians 4:18) The Philippians had communicated with Paul concerning giving and receiving (Philippians 4:15). They sent once and again unto his necessities (verse 16). This was fruit that abounded to their account (verse 17). It was an odour of a sweet smell, a sacrifice, acceptable, well pleasing unto God (verse18).
- 5. Did you obey your parents? (Colossians 3:20) Children are to obey their parents in all things because this is well pleasing (acceptable) unto the Lord.
- 6. Did you pray for all in authority? (1 Timothy 2:3) We are exhorted to make supplications, intercessions and giving of thanks for all men, for kings, and for all that are in authority so that we may lead a quiet and peaceable life (1 Timothy 2:1-2). This is what is good and acceptable in the sight of God our Saviour.
- 7. Did you show piety at home and requite your parents? (1 Timothy 5:4) To requite our parents is to recompense, to give back, to restore to them the love and care they gave to us as children. This applies to both sons and nephews.
- 8. Did you serve God acceptably with reverence and godly fear? (Hebrews 12:28) God's grace is available to us to serve Him, but not just to serve Him to serve Him with reverence and godly fear. Reverence is a sense of modesty or bashfulness. It is having an innate repugnance to doing something dishonorably. It restrains a good man from committing an unworthy act. Godly fear is caution or circumspection. It is the consideration of all the facts, circumstances, and potential consequences of participating in any given activity, and in light of them measuring a response with a view to a correct course of conduct. Christ expects nothing less from those who trust in Him.
- 9. Did you offer up spiritual sacrifices? (1 Peter 2:5; 1 Peter 2:9; Hebrews 13:15) Have you shown forth the praises of him who hath called you out of darkness into His marvelous light? Such praises are the sacrifices God is looking for. They are the fruit of our lips, giving thanks to His name. With such sacrifices, God is indeed very well pleased.
- 10. Did you patiently take suffering for well doing?

(1 Peter 2:20) What glory is it if we patiently take what we deserve when we are buffeted for our faults? But when we patiently take what we do not deserve, suffering for well doing, this is acceptable with God.

Conclusion

When God saves us, He grants us the potential to be acceptable. Ephesians 1:6 says that *He has made us accepted in the beloved.* After that, he works with us to develop that potential, *working in [us] that which is well pleasing in his sight, through Jesus Christ.* It is up to us to cooperate by proving what is acceptable unto the Lord (Ephesians 5:10). The degree to which we do that will determine what we receive from Christ when we have our personal interview with Him at His judgment seat.

So how are you doing? Are you ready for that interview? Are you ready to stand before Christ, face to face, and look Him in the eye and declare *I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith* (2 Timothy 4:7). Will Jesus declare to you in that interview *Well done, thou good and faithful servant?* There is no time like the present to prepare for your personal interview with Jesus Christ.

Elder Notes



The Pastor's participation in Samaritan's Ministries for medical expenses is secure for the time being as the healthcare bill passed by Congress included a provision that exempts participants in sharing ministries from the requirement to purchase health insurance.


